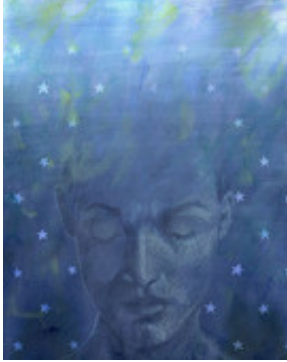

Dr. Swaner and Dr. Ranks discuss foundational knowledge for understanding the Principles of Archetypal Studies

“Echo and Narcissus: Reflection on Reflection and Narcissism, the Disorder”

Echoing silence may describe the etiology of pathological narcissism. This myth calls for the exploration of metaphor and theory in the work of Kohut, Kernberg and Knox. We re-view Fonagy and Kalshed to rethink the ongoing trauma of one hand clapping. The etiology of narcissism is reviewed in the perspective of attachment theory and neuropsychological substrates. Recent neuro-imaging studies, reviewed by Wilkinson, are explored that support the assertion of an innate capacity of human infants for social interaction and development of an awareness of other minds, mirroring processes, implicit and emotional parenting styles effect surprising albeit expectable turns in a narcissistic environment, that essentially deprives optimal function of the infant and child.

David Miller, B.D., Ph.D.

Dr. Miller presents a hermeneutical adventure in art and science that reflects the archetype Hermes: Who is the guide to new fields and depths of understanding, who explores and dissolves theoretical boundaries, and imagines new perspectives. Dr. David L. Miller, Archetypal Psychologist, is a Watson-Ledden Professor of Religion, Emeritus, at Syracuse University and is retired Core Faculty Member of Pacifica Graduate Institute in Santa Barbara. Since 1963, Miller has worked at the intersection of depth psychologies (Jungian and Freudian), religions and mythologies, literature and literary theory. Miller's unique contribution to the understanding of psychologies, psychoanalysis, analytic theory and religion are notable. He is an honorary member of the Inter-Regional Society of Jungian Analysts and the International Association of Analytical Psychology. 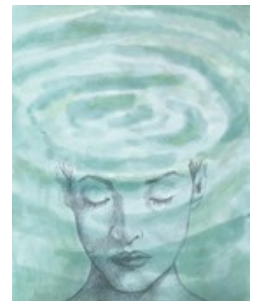

“Kaleidoscope: The Many Mirrors of the Psyche”

Dr. Miller's illustrated presentation will review the psychological theories that describe therapeutic and pathological functions by utilizing the metaphor of the mirror. He will differentiate a variety of types of psychotherapy, each based on its special manner of mirroring.
